Parking Alert for Oakland

Carnegie Library of Pittsburgh Customers Encouraged to Use Alternative Parking November 17 -25, 2007

(PITTSBURGH, PA – November 12, 2007) Visitors traveling to Carnegie Library of Pittsburgh – Main in Oakland may experience parking constraints November 17 – 25. Due to the member preview of the Carnegie Museum of Natural History’s Dinosaurs in Their Time Exhibit, the parking lot shared by the Library and Museum is expected to fill up quickly.

Library visitors are encouraged to use alternate parking at one of the approximately 4,000 parking spots within a few blocks of the Library. A free shuttle service will run on a continuous loop from 11 am – 6 pm to selected offsite parking locations. The shuttle will run from Carnegie Museums to parking lots at Soldiers and Sailors and four Carnegie Mellon University lots including the Collaborative Innovation Center Garage on Forbes Avenue, Dithridge Street Garage, East Campus Garage and Forbes Avenue Parking Lot on the following dates only:

- Saturday, November 17
- Sunday, November 18
- Wednesday, November 21
- Saturday, November 24
- Sunday, November 25
